Malnutrition: causes, consequences and solution by Carolyn Taylor

Malnutrition continues to be a problem, which is estimated to cost £13 billion per annum (British Association of Parenteral and Enteral Nutrition [BAPEN], 2010). The majority of those at risk of malnutrition are living in the community. When resources are limited, it is important to identify who is most at risk so that they can receive appropriate support. This article explains the malnutrition carousel, where malnutrition leads to poor health that then further increases the risk of malnutrition. It discusses the need for balanced diets to help maintain an adequate nutritional state, highlighting which disease states are likely to cause further problems — in particular, those with swallowing problems where texture-modified diets are required. Suggested solutions are also provided to help treat suspected poor nutritional intake.

Mock Clinical Trials Event November 2018 Tap versus Cap

The CCA Research Centre held a mock clinical trials event where attendees were taken through the process of all aspects of setting up and conducting a clinical trial. A number of clinicians attended from across the Care Group. We used the example of finding out participants' views of the difference between the taste of tap and bottled water. All attendees took part in the mock trial and results were analysed and fed back to the group. Following the event the group were given a pack of resources with all the information required to develop and conduct a research study.

The event was evaluated very well and we will be looking to repeat it in the future. Following feedback we will also be exploring shorter sessions to focus on particular aspects of the research process. Look out for further details of this in forthcoming research bulletins.

- ☑ you require statistical support for publications, PhD vivas or theses, or conference presentations

If you have not yet registered your project but have identified a potential funding stream, please contact me as you may still be eligible for statistical support. If your research project is or will be portfolio-adopted and you are at pre-award/design stage, please obtain support via http://www.rds-yh.nihr.ac.uk/ or http://www.shef.ac.uk/ctru.




Palliative Care Research Network

- ☑ Thursday 28th November 10.30am—12.30 pm


