Launch of the Ageing Research Network:

A new, city wide forum has been set up to represent all the research interests across Sheffield and the first meeting was well attended with clinical and academic researchers from public health, acute care, dementia services and housing. The meeting was held at Sheffield Hallam, Collegiate Campus and presentations included John Soady — the ageing population and indicators of wellbeing and Liz Philpots supported discussion about the range, scope and opportunity for further studies and partnership across research and clinical institutions. The Community Elders Panel for PPI was represented by the co-ordinator who has enabled housebound older people to contribute to research ideas and priorities.

The next meeting on Wednesday, 11th March 2020 will be held at the new Advanced Wellbeing Research Centre (AWRC) in Darnall. The meeting will include 5 short presentations demonstrating existing study areas and also report on the NIHR portfolio studies that have opened in the city and which relate to the older adult population.

The Village of Hope, Delhi



In February 2020 one of the podiatry team – Dr Lisa Farndon will be travelling to Delhi, India to work as a podiatrist in the Village of Hope. This village is run by the Hope Foundation and is for people suffering from Leprosy. Leprosy is a disease which can affect the feet and hands, causing ulcerations and often amputations. Last year money was raised to give out 53 tricycles to some of the village members to help them move

around more easily. We are hoping to raise money before the visit so we can purchase some more tricycles as there are 60 people on the waiting list for these. Praful Das (aged 65, pictured) lives in The Hope leprosy complex. He is also one of the leprosy affected patients who has ulcers on his feet. However, his ulcers are getting better after starting using the tricycle more frequently. Prior to this he used to walk bare foot and that was stopping the foot ulcers from healing. Going to market used to

be a big challenge for Praful Das but after delivery of the tricycle he can go without having any difficulties. Now he has started a small shop 'in house' to generate minimal income for his survival. We are also planning on trialling some special sandals and insoles to try and help people with ulcerations get quicker healing. 
